Celebrating Easter

Many symbols are used to celebrate Easter. When people think of Easter they might call to mind, decorated eggs, beautiful lilies or an Easter Bunny. Many of the most common symbols of Easter have an origin that goes back many years.

What does an Easter Bunny have to do with the Resurrection of Jesus Christ? (Nothing) The Easter Bunny began as a German symbol of fertility. Because Easter is in the spring, a season of rebirth, the bunny became associated with new life. The Easter Bunny didn't appear in America until the 1700's. Instead of an image of Jesus rising from the tomb, the most frequently used image to celebrate Easter is the Easter Bunny. Sadly, if people want to send an Easter card, it is becoming more difficult to find one with a spiritual message.

The egg has a much longer history of being associated with Easter and has important spiritual meaning. The egg represents new life. The egg's shell calls to mind Jesus' tomb from which he emerged on Easter morning. Originally, Easter eggs were painted with bright colors that represented sunlight and the colors of spring. Decorated eggs have also been given as gifts.

It wouldn't be Easter without beautiful, fragrant flowers. The Lily is often called the "white robed apostles of hope." On Easter Sunday, churches all over the world decorate their Communion Table with an array of Lilies. The Daffodil, narcissus, tulip and hyacinth are also Easter symbols because they also bloom in the spring.

As a spring blooming plant, the Dogwood is a symbol of Christ's crucifixion. The four petals of a Dogwood form the shape of a cross. The marks on the outer edge of the petals symbolize the nails. The center of the flower often resembles a crown. The red berries represent Christ's blood.

The chrysalis and butterfly are symbolic of the clothes found at the empty tomb and Jesus' resurrection. Peter and John rushed to the tomb and discovered nothing but strips of linen. "He saw the strips of linen lying there as well as the burial cloth that had been around Jesus' head." (John 20:6-7) Like a caterpillar that emerges as a beautiful butterfly by leaving the remains of its empty chrysalis, Jesus rose from the dead.

One of the most inspiring Bible passages to celebrate Easter is John 14: 25-26, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die."

Living Well

Silence

“The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth be silent before him” (Habakkuk 2:20).

Sadly silence is rare in our world today, including our Christian culture, but it is an essential discipline for the spiritual life in Christ. In the discipline of silence we abstain from sound in order to make space for a deeper engagement with God and other people.

Silence is Strong Medicine

One way to think of the disciplines for the spiritual life in Christ is that they are like medicines to treat the afflictions of our soul. They're supposed to minister God's grace in a way that heals us and transforms us to be more like Jesus, more stable and loving.

The strongest medicine in our spiritual disciplines cabinet is silence. If we spend enough time before God in silence the Holy Spirit will evoke and bring up into our consciousness whatever sins, burdens, or hurts that we've repressed. This awareness may be troubling or painful, which is why so many people avoid quiet and stillness. But if we will let ourselves be opened by the Spirit in silence then the healing light of God can minister to us.

Ways to Practice Silence

Silence as a discipline that goes with solitude has two sides: not speaking and not listening to sounds, except perhaps the gentle sounds of nature. When we learn to keep silence the quiet moves from our environment into our soul and the absence of sound becomes a wonderful realization of the presence of God as we feel the refreshing wind of eternity blowing gently on our face.

We can also practice silent prayer with others in community and in this way those who are more mature spiritually can welcome others into being silent together in the presence of the risen Christ.

The other way to keep silence in community is by listening others speak. We do this by offering empathy and prayer in conversation or in a meeting we might refrain from speaking as a way of promoting the ideas of others.

Prayers to Go Deep with God in Silence

The Word of God is tremendous resource to help us enter into silent prayer and benefit from it. Meditation on Scripture helps us to be still in body and mind and quiet ourselves in God's presence. You can try one of these ways to praying Scripture to help you enter into silent prayer:

- Gently repeat Psalm 46:10 in this way: “Be still and know that I am God... Be still and know that I AM... Be still and know... Be still... Be...”
- Sit beside a lake or stream or imagine yourself there as you meditate on the story of Jesus calming the storm at sea with three words that come from his deep trust in the Father during the life-threatening storm: “Peace. Be Still.” (Mark 4:39)
- Picture in your mind the Gospel stories of Jesus blessing the children. Imagine yourself as one of the children as you pray.(Psalm 131)

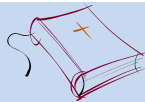

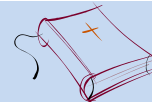
The Deacons thank everyone for serving as ushers and greeters. If you cannot serve on the date assigned, please let the office know so the correct names appear in the bulletin.

Supper Club:

We had a most inspiring talk on Tuesday, February 9th when Rev. Dr. Cynthia Huling-Hummel spoke to us about "Living with a Diagnosis". She was diagnosed in 2011 with amnesic Mild Cognitive Impairment (a precursor to Alzheimer's Disease). She shared her perspective on how to deal with losses in life and living with a diagnosis which may change over time. Her faith is an important part of her response to loss.

News from the Outreach Committee

One Great Hour of Sharing: We will be celebrating One Great Hour of Sharing on Palm Sunday, March 20th. Through your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, you can serve people in your community and around the world by alleviating hunger, rebuilding after crises or catastrophe, and working with communities to overcome oppression – a few examples of the impact of your gifts:

- 220,000 people received food, water, shelter, and medical care in the aftermath of the Nepal earthquakes through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance
- over 308,000 people in over 30 countries now have increased food security and livelihoods through international development work through the Presbyterian Hunger Program
- more than 10,000 children and their families in five bateyes in the Dominican Republic have access to clean water, helping to prevent water-related diseases through Self-Development of People.

Outreach will also be offering the Presbyterian Giving Catalog, which is a unique way to make a difference in the world. Every gift, large or small, expands our witness to God's gracious and abundant work in the world.

Grandma's Kitchen: Grandma's Kitchen serves warm, home-cooked meals, served with a smile. It is held on Tuesdays and Thursdays every week from 2:20-3 PM in the Penn Yan Academy Cafeteria. 40-50% of Penn Yan Academy students rely on the school for 2 of their 3 daily meals. The goal is at least 15 churches will be involved so our church will only have to cook every 7 weeks. This has been initiated by the Penn Yan National Honor Society – leadership, character, scholarship and service. Thursday, March 10th is our church's second date to assist with this community project – please see Joy to sign-up to help with setup and serving. In February, our church served the students – what a wonderful experience – so many 'thank you' from the students!

Feed a Pet Sunday: Through Pet Partners Connections, please bring un-opened dog or cat food or litter when you come to church on Sunday, March 6th. This will help Yates County families keep their pets in their homes and not have to surrender or abandon them due to cost.

Camp Whitman

Summer Camp 2016: Each summer we host two concurrent camp programs – Pine Camp (a residential recreation program for teens and adults ages 11-65 with developmental disabilities) and Tradition Camp (a residential summer camp program for school-age youth ages 6-17). Campers in each program have their own counselors, cabins and specially designed activities. The two programs join together each day for meals and evening programs. The camp is a small camp, hosting approximately 65 overnight campers per week. The campers are organized into ‘family groups’ designated by their ages. Family groups are co-ed, but cabins are separated by gender. Campers sleep in small four-bed cabins that are clustered together around a central campfire ring. Living in close quarters subtly encourages children to open up, share and explore their faith in a safe and protective environment. Counselors either sleep in the same cabin as campers or in a neighboring cabin, and are on duty chaperoning campers 24 hours/day.

- Session 1 is July 3-8 with the topic ‘Anything Goes’
- Session 2 is July 10-15 with the topic ‘Whitman Olympics’
- Session 3 is July 17-23 with the topic ‘Water Fun’
- Session 4 is July 24-29 with the topic ‘Outdoor Adventures’
- Session 5 is July 31-August 5 with the topic ‘Night Owl’
- Session 6 is August 7-12 with the topic ‘Helping Hands Week’

Mission Trip Base Camp: A new program at Camp Whitman especially for church youth groups. Each day youth and chaperones will volunteer at an area work site (projects may include painting, cleaning, gardening, etc.) and return to camp each afternoon for swimming, games, dinner and campfire worship time. All meals are included. Groups must provide their own chaperones (minimum 1 chaperone per 8 youth) and transportation to work sites. The dates are August 7-12. Design Team Cluster Visits: The Design Team that was formed out of last year's Presbytery retreat is developing a list of local church clusters they will visit to elicit input on the future direction of the Presbytery of Geneva. These will be open to all who wish to make comments and suggestions about our future together.

Moderator's Outreach: Along the same lines as the Design Team clusters, I intend to visit throughout the Presbytery on a "listening tour." These visits will be open agendas to gather thoughts and concerns from the pulpits and the pews. These meetings will not necessarily use the same clustering as the Design Team, but the attempt will be made to assure that no church has to travel more than 30 minutes to attend a site. Sites will be arranged after the winter weather concerns have abated.

Temporary Transitional Leader Outreach: In the months ahead, Bronwen Boswell will be visiting clusters of pastors to acquaint herself with the pastoral leadership of the Presbytery.

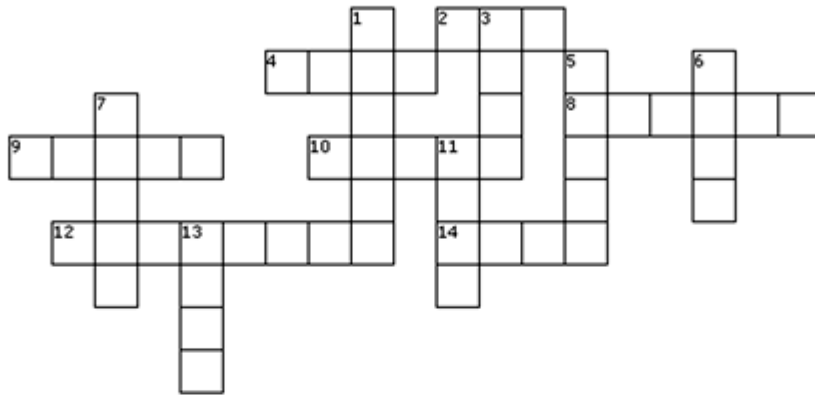
