Easter's Blessings

For me, the most inspiring Christian celebration is Easter. As Easter approaches, let's consider the transforming significance of the amazing miracle of the Resurrection.

Jesus was seen alive by those who knew beyond any doubt that he died on the cross. Eye witnesses were available for questioning and investigation by people for at least a generation after the events were reported. A belief in the miracle of Jesus Christ coming back to life is both reasonable and plausible.

In 1 Corinthians Chapter 15, the Apostle Paul describes Jesus' resurrection. "Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me."

I think the most important evidence that Jesus Christ came back to life is the transformation in the lives of the witnesses. The disciples went from being cowards, who fled in fear and abandoned Jesus into the hands of his enemies, to become brave apostles who publically proclaimed their faith even at the risk of their own death. There had to be a compelling reason for their complete turnaround.

Easter is more than a mere historical curiosity. Easter influences our lives today. What God does for Jesus Christ, God does not do for Jesus alone. Through Easter, we too share in the resurrection of the Lord. Death was not the end of the story for Jesus nor will it be the end of our story.

Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." (John 11:25-26)

What God did for the disciples, God also does for us. We too can live boldly and courageously. Easter means we are empowered to live our lives in a new way. Because the tomb is empty, life is completely different. Hope is always alive.

Easter is more than a day. Easter is a way of improving our lives through the resurrection of hope.

News from Session

Announcement from Presbytery Office of the General Assembly, Stated Clerk: January 28, 2017, Stated Clerk opposes order banning refugees' entry into U.S. ". . . As the top ecclesial officer of the nation's largest Reformed body, I urge the president and his administration to reverse this very harmful decision regarding refugees. Presbyterians are not afraid of this so-called terror threat. We are not afraid because we profess a faith in Jesus, who entered the world a refugee. . . ." Read the full content of the letter at pcusa.org/page/refugee or copies are available in the back of the sanctuary.

From PCUSA – 'We Choose Welcome': "When we welcome refugees, we welcome the refugee Jesus. Warned in a dream, Joseph and Mary took the infant Jesus to Egypt to keep him safe from Herod. At that moment, he and his parents became refugees. Our recent observance of Holocaust Remembrance Day reminds us that our nation's record of welcome is far from perfect. Jewish refugees fleeing persecution were turned away from our shore during that time. On countless occasions since, however, our nation has provided succor for those fleeing persecution, war, and violence. As this is being written, our nation, and we as Presbyterians, face another moment of decision. Will we welcome refugees in Jesus' name or will we go along with policies that would turn away those unable to remain in their homes and forced to seek safety and security in other nations, including our own? This past week, the President signed an executive order that would halt refugee resettlement and would bar refugees from certain (mostly Muslim majority) countries entering the United States. Church World Service reports that the

order suspends the US Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for 120 days for all populations, indefinitely bars Syrian refugees from resettlement in the United States and does not allow entry into the country of nationals from Iraq, Iran, Libya, Syria, Somalia, Sudan and Yemen (this includes refugees and people with Special Immigrant Visas) for the next 90 days. The premise is that this will protect us from terrorists. Presbyterians, along with people of other faiths and people of good will, have responded that we will not give in to fear and we will follow the call of Jesus to welcome. In a January 28, 2017 statement, the Rev. dr. J. Herbert Nelson II, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) said "We stand ready to welcome our new neighbors, friends and family of all faiths and nations." From Presbyterian Mission: 'Presbyterian churches hold out hope in efforts to host and welcome refugees' – 'Congregations call ministry a blessing' – "While the White House and the courts battle over the legality of the travel ban on refugees and travelers from seven countries, Presbyterian churches across the U.S. are still hopeful for a quick resolution. . . . Celebrate Service, Celebrate Yates: For 20 years, Keuka College and the Yates County Chamber of Commerce have collaborated to host *Celebrate Service* ... *Celebrate Yates* (CSCY), an annual day of community service which has provided hands-on help to dozens of Yates County non-profit agencies, thanks to hundreds of volunteers from the College and local community. With support from local merchants who underwrite costs, CSCY volunteers join hands on one Sunday each April, serving collectively to meet needs of Yates County nonprofits. CSCY began as a community service initiative conceived by Keuka Circle Fellowship Scholar Tracy Swem Morgan '98 and now stands in testament to years of partnership, support, and goodwill. On Sunday April 23rd this year, the partnership between Keuka College and the Yates County Chamber of Commerce comes to life as hundreds of volunteers – not just Keuka students, but local families, children, and senior citizens – join hands to serve non-profits across

the county. As many as 30 different non-profits, including fire departments, churches (including our church), youth camps, libraries, cemeteries, nature trails, sports fields, and more receive have received volunteer labor to rake, repair, paint, dust, mop, and generally clean the non-profit buildings, site or equipment. We will be raking leaves and performing general yard work.

Help on the church bus: The Trustees are looking for volunteers to help during the transportation of disabled church goers to their churches. News from the Outreach

Alternative Spring Break: Outreach is supporting the spiritual and religious development of Keuka College students by making a gift to support the Alternative Spring Break trip to Costa Rica. This is an opportunity for the students to learn about other cultures and themselves, to develop leadership skills and to grow spiritually, as they wrestle with injustices they see. In the past, in Costs Rica, they have taught English, sang songs, played soccer, dodge ball, volleyball and basketball with boys (ages 8-18) in an orphanage; painted a house and a school; attended a recovery meeting; drank freshly harvested coconut 'milk' with the men at a farm for drug addiction rehabilitation; visited with senior citizens in a retirement community; attended worship service in Spanish, zip-lined through the forest canopy and swam in the hot springs. Alternative Spring Break reinforces the values of service and social responsibility. By interacting with the people of Costa Rica, spending time with two incredible missionaries — Ralph and Mary (Curtis) Miller, Penn Yan Academy and Keuka College graduate, and also with one another, students' lives are changed.

One Great Hour of Sharing: We will be celebrating One Great Hour of Sharing on Palm Sunday, April 9th. Through your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, you can serve people in your community and around the world by alleviating hunger, rebuilding after crises or catastrophe, and working with communities to overcome oppression – a few examples of the impact of your gifts:

- 220,000 people received food, water, shelter, and medical care in the aftermath of the Nepal earthquakes through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance
- over 308,000 people in over 30 countries now have increased food security and livelihoods through international development work through the Presbyterian Hunger Program
- more than 10,000 children and their families in five bateyes in the Dominican Republic have access to clean water, helping to prevent water-related diseases through Self-Development of People.

Outreach will also be offering the Presbyterian Giving Catalog, which is a unique way to make a difference in the world. Every gift, large or small, expands our witness to God's gracious and abundant work in the world.

Sunday Hospitality

Helping With Hospitality

Sunday morning is for many the core of our congregational life, a special time of the week when we gather to reflect and contemplate, celebrate, and revere life's mysteries and things of ultimate concerns. During this time we are spending with each other and getting involved in each other's lives, deep fellowship is experienced. The relationships are the glue that hold the church together.

Sustaining each service is a group of volunteers who perform hospitality duties to make the service comfortable and pleasing for our congregation.

Many hands make light work. Everyone is encouraged to participate. As a congregation we all share the responsibility of welcoming each other and hosting our guests. Newcomers are also invited to participate. Helping with hospitality is a great way to get to know other newcomers and longtime members and feel more a part of the church family.

Each week it takes about seven volunteers and two additional volunteers are needed monthly to support our Sunday Service. When everyone volunteers a few times during the church year, every task can be comfortably covered.

Ushers (2) - Each Sunday one usher welcomes people at the church entrance; one distributes bulletins in the aisle. Ushers help collect offerings, light candles, restock pew racks, ring church bell, manage microphone during announcements and joys/concerns, etc.

Greeters (2) - Greeters welcome people as they enter the sanctuary, encourage people to wear name tags, help with collection of offering, host Coffee Hour and chooses to make it as simple or as complex as wants (the quality of fellowship is more important than quality of the food).

Nursery - Volunteer provides adult supervision in the nursery after the Youth Message until church is over. The sermon can be heard in the nursery.

Lay Reader - Volunteer reads the Scriptures assigned by the pastor at the podium.

Communion Server - Volunteer helps serve Communion, usually the first Sunday of the month.

Birthday Cake Maker - Volunteer provides cake/cupcakes for the Coffee Hour the second Sunday of the month.

How Do I Sign Up?

The easiest way to sign-up to volunteer as a Greeter, Usher, Lay Reader, helper in the nursery, server of Communion, birthday cake baker, etc. is to sign your name in a blank space on

the scheduling sheet that is posted on the bulletin board in the foyer. A complete list of duties for each task is also posted there. If you have not yet had the opportunity to volunteer at one of these tasks, feel free to ask for a coach.

It is suggested that each person volunteer for greeter and usher two times per year, once during January - June and once each July - December.
