Pastor's Ponderings

The Most Important Gifts

Christmas celebrates how the long awaited Messiah comes to earth offering us peace on earth and goodwill to all. Christmas is about God coming to us as a human child.

Unfortunately, commercialism can get us off track from the deeper significance of Christmas. A lot of energy revolves around shopping and less around the spiritual meaning of the season.

Do we really need to buy all kinds of stuff for people at Christmas? Many people already have enough stuff. Often, we give gifts that people don't need and will probably never use. An article in the Wall Street Journal cited that only 20% of the clothes in the average person's closet are worn on a regular basis.

Jesus Christ is the most satisfying gift any of us could ever receive. Think of all the gifts God gives us. First we are blessed with joy. Jesus shares with us in John 15:11, "I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete." Jesus gives us a lasting joy that no possession can match.

Additionally, in John 14:27, Jesus assures us, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

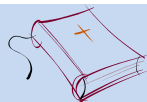

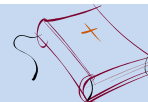
The Deacons thank everyone for serving as ushers and greeters. If you cannot serve on the date assigned, please let the office know so the correct names appear in the bulletin.

Being a Christian isn't easy. Sustaining belief without any doubts for one's entire life is a very rare accomplishment. Indeed, many would say that examining one's faith at least once is a central part of the Christian condition. In this landmark work, esteemed theologian Paul F. Knitter explains the unique path that he took to overcome his doubts, becoming a stronger Christian in the process.

Honest and unflinching, 'Without Buddha I Could not be a Christian' narrates each spiritual dilemma that Knitter has struggled with and explains how a Buddhist worldview has allowed him to resolve each one. From the 'petitioning' nature of Christian prayer to how Christianity views life after death, Knitter argues that a Buddhist standpoint can help inspire a more person-centered conception of Christianity, where individual religious experience comes first, and liturgy and tradition second. Moving and revolutionary, this edition comes with a new postscript in which Professor Knitter reflects on and re-evaluates his position as a double-belonger.

Every year during Advent, we generally see a sign reading “Merry Xmas”! Some Christians have been offended by the word *Xmas*. They say the letter X should not be substituted for Christ as though it were a modern insult to our Lord. However, it really is not. Xmas has ancient origins. The letter X in Greek – the original language of the New Testament – is the first letter of the word *Xristos*, which translated into English is the word Christ. So X is simply an abbreviation for the word Christ. And the letters *mas* are an abbreviation of the word mass. Therefore, *Xmas* really means *Christ mass* or *Christ worship*.

‘Take Steps to Avoid Caregiver Burnout’

If you have ever been the caretaker of a loved one, or even if you are a professional in the field, it is a tough job, and you have to learn a few tricks to give the other person and yourself the care you both deserve.

I am currently the caretaker for a loved one in hospice. It is pretty much a 24/7 job, but right now I can be there for her and I am going to embrace every moment we have together. But the truth is I am tired.

Daily morning runs to the doctor for injections, trying to find something she will eat, cleaning up after her. I have become numb to most of it. Being woken at all hours has turned into just napping any chance I get. Getting up before 6:00AM is not why I became a writer.

One of the ways I give myself a mini vacation is to imagine being in the south of France, drinking champagne, and laughing. The pressure of watching a loved one die and taking on the task of caring for that individual really means that you are giving up at least part of, if not most of, your life. You now come second, and any seasoned caregiver will tell you to put your own oxygen mask on first, but when it comes to a loved one, that rule can be overlooked.

One thing that helps is being around other positive people, doing simple fun things like having dinner. I enjoy that kind of energy and get nurtured through it. What works best for me is when other people come by and hang out, so I don’t have to leave my loved one, and they can also say hello and bring her a little love and good energy. Times like these make the process of being a caregiver much easier.

There will be times when it feels like it is too much. You may even have thoughts that you’d wish the person you are caring for would just pass peacefully, and then you feel guilty. This happens because you are overwhelmed and perhaps approaching burnout. Now is when it is really important to take care of yourself, so you can continue taking care of the one who needs you.

There are support groups for caregivers. Call your local hospital and ask if they can recommend any in your area. The Internet can also be very helpful. You can keep a journal to

get your feelings out. You can post on Facebook or blog to release some of your stress, and getting positive feedback will help keep you strong.

Remember that you are doing an amazing thing here. You have given up much of your life to care for a person who is almost ready to leave. This is a gift to both of you, but it is one that takes a lot of energy, so brace yourself and find ways to get the support you need to keep going.

This is not an easy process; there are tears and laughter and a wild ride with someone who may be bedridden. But the gift you are giving will come back to you. By caring for another, you are being your best self, and the other person is getting the help he or she deserves. It is all good. Just remember to take care of yourself.
